But at midnight there was a cry, 'Behold! The bridegroom is coming! Come out to meet him!' <sup>7</sup>Then all those virgins arose, and trimmed their lamps. <sup>8</sup>The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' <sup>9</sup>But the wise answered, saying, 'What if there isn't enough for us and you? You go rather to those who sell, and buy for yourselves.' <sup>10</sup>While they went away to buy, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went in with him to the marriage feast, and the door was shut. <sup>11</sup>Afterward the other virgins also came, saying, 'Lord, Lord, open to us.' <sup>12</sup>But he answered, 'Most certainly I tell you, I don't know you.' <sup>13</sup> Watch therefore, for you don't know the day nor the hour in which the Son of Man is coming.
